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


## CURRENT VIEWS OF CALIFORNIA VOTERS AND PARENTS ON SCHOOL REOPENING

*Key findings from a phone and online survey among California voters, including public school parents, conducted March 2021* 


### **Sample Notes**

- 1,839 registered voters
- 661 public school parents (including oversample interviews)
- Public school parents are 25% of the weighted statewide sample
- Mixed mode: phone and online, including phone sample of voters in lowincome ZIP Codes

#### Overall Direction of California




A growing number of voters think that the spread of the coronavirus is mostly under control, though majorities say it is still a serious problem.



Voters, including parents, approve of the decisions their school district has made about whether, when, and how schools should reopen for in-person instruction.


Approval of School District's Decisions about Opening Schools for In-person Instruction

Which is more important in decisions about opening schools for in-person instruction?



### We are measuring increased confidence among parents that schools are safe for in-person learning—but still, fewer than half are very or fairly confident.




## Similarly, there has been a marked uptick in the percentage of parents who feel comfortable sending their own child to school for in-person instruction.

PARENTS: Level of Comfort with Sending Child to School for In-Person Instruction at this Time





Despite their increasing comfort levels, parents still are more concerned about their children getting infected than falling behind academically—and are evenly divided about whether they'll send their own children back in person.





ALL VOTERS: Preferred Operation of my District's Schools at the End of March









### Voters and parents say schools need to make major modifications in order to reopen for in-person instruction, and that they need more funding in order to do so.


View of Reopening Schools for In-Person Instruction

Schools should only be allowed to reopen if they have made major changes to prevent spread of COVID-19

Schools can reopen on a pretty normal basis, without many changes from before COVID-19



CA Schools' Funding for Dealing with Impacts of COVID-19 in Reopening Public Schools






Majorities say schools should reopen for in-person instruction only after teachers have had the chance to be vaccinated.






Only when transmission rates are below 5% do a clear majority say public schools in a county should be required to open for in-person instruction; most say schools in red zones should operate remotely.
