The Americans For Prosperity–Utah's "2021 Legislative Scorecard" represents legislation from the chapter's priority initiatives. The scored legislation does not represent all legislation of 2021 in which AFP would have a principled interest, but the legislation for which AFP mobilized grassroots activity, key voted, or otherwise actively engaged on.

Though AFP-Utah is highly appreciative of the most aligned legislators, it is also appreciative of legislators with whom we have less overall alignment and who sponsored or supported key legislation. We look forward to building policy coalitions from across the political spectrum to advance transformative legislation that remove barriers and increases opportunity for all Utahns.

This year's AFP Scorecard is a comprehensive view into how the Utah State Legislature voted during the 2021 Regular Legislative Session. The project is a labor of love by our team members. We scored 37 bills and tallied nearly 3,669 total votes to bring you this scorecard. #### SCORING METHODOLOGY

Scores on the AFP-Utah Scorecard are calculated using the following formula:

#### FOR BILLS AFP SUPPORTED:

AYE Vote = 1 Points

NAY Vote = 0 Point

Non votes and absences were not calculated for or against the member's score, as there is not a method for assuming intent or extenuating circumstances.

#### FOR BILLS AFP OPPOSED:

AYE Vote = 0 Points

NAY Vote = 1 Point

#### **Prime Sponsor Credits**

Legislators who sponsored aligned priority legislation were awarded an additional point. Similarly, points were deducted from the scores of legislators who sponsored unaligned legislation.

### GRADES ARE ASSIGNED ACCORDING TO THE FOLLOWING SCALE:

**A+** = 100% or Greater

A = 90-99%

B = 80-89%

c = 70-79%

D = 60-69%

F = 59% or Less

#### **UTAH FILM ECONOMIC INCENTIVES | SB 167**

Sen. Ronald Winterton, Rep. Michael Kohler

This bill increases the amount that the state can give to film companies in tax breaks. The research has shown no positive gain for Utah taxpayers by offering breaks to companies filming in Utah. Utah offers talent and one-of-a-kind locals that will continue to be used by the industry without giving millions in taxpayer money. Utah should foster a friendly, low-cost environment that will draw film companies and other industries to grow in Utah. *Became Law without Governor Signature*.

# CONCURRENT RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE RESTORATION AND REFORM HCR 23

Rep. Keven Stratton, Sen. Kirk Cullimore

This bill makes working toward smart criminal justice reforms an official policy position of the legislature. This affirmation will lead lawmakers to make smart, evidence-based decisions to keep the public safe while limiting involvement with the criminal justice system. *Signed by Governor.* 

#### POST CERTIFICATION AMENDMENTS | HB 62

Rep. Andrew Stoddard, Sen. Luz Escamilla

This bill adds dishonest conduct deception or biased and prejudicial conduct to suspend or revoke a peace officer's certification. It's important for public trust and officer safety to hold our peace officers to high standards. *Signed by Governor*.

### USE OF FORCE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS HB 84

Rep. Angela Romero, Sen. Jacob Anderegg

This bill creates statewide reporting requirements for use of force incidents where the data can be used to assist lawmakers and other stakeholders in making more evidence-based decisions to improve policing. *Signed by Governor.* 



#### **ASSET FORFEITURE AMENDMENTS | SB 98**

Sen. Todd Weiler, Rep. Karianne Lisonbee

This bill adds significant procedural protections to the civil forfeiture process to ensure property owners are afforded better due process rights when the government attempts to take ownership of their property. While we support the legislature ultimately requiring a criminal conviction before any forfeiture can exist, this legislation is a great step. Significant reforms in this legislation include narrowing the circumstances when state and local law enforcement can transfer a civil forfeiture case to the federal government (where fewer legal protections exist), expedite forfeiture proceedings to ensure a speedy resolution to property rights, reduces the circumstances when the property can be forfeited, and increases prosecutorial training. *Signed by Governor*.

# SENTENCING COMMISSION REQUIREMENTS SB 126

Sen. Daniel Thatcher, Rep. Marsha Judkins

This bill requires the Utah Sentencing Commission to create a list of all collateral consequences related to a conviction and make this list public. This information will be useful in how we continue to determine what collateral consequences should be attached to criminal convictions. We often don't think about the long list of lifelong ramifications of a criminal conviction, and often those lead to more issues that government perpetually tries to address. *Signed by Governor*.

### DRIVER LICENSE SUSPENSION AMENDMENTS HB 143

Rep. A. Cory Maloy, Sen. Michael Kennedy

This bill ends the practice of suspending driver's licenses for unpaid court debt. This causes many to be caught in an endless cycle of involvement with the criminal justice system. By taking away a person's ability to get to and from work for non-public safety reasons, we remove their ability to earn money needed to pay their court fees and other needed expenses. Ending this practice will help many get back on their feet and lead to higher collection rates of unpaid debt. *Signed by Governor.* 

### LAW ENFORCEMENT DATA MANAGEMENT REQUIREMENTS | SB 159

Sen. Jacob Anderegg, Rep. Paul Ray

This bill requires the Utah Commission on Criminal Justice and Juvenile Justice to create a panel to assess and recommend collecting and centralizing data regarding the criminal justice system statewide. We must have standardized reporting across Utah to ensure we are making informed decisions regarding the criminal justice system. *Signed by Governor.* 



### PROBATION AND PAROLE AMENDMENTS HB 290

Rep. Keven Stratton, Sen. Todd Weiler

This bill will add a new member to the Utah Sentencing Commission, adding an important perspective from someone who works on civil rights or civil liberties issues. The commission is tasked with studying and making recommendations to community supervision in order to reduce high recidivism rates in the state. *Signed by Governor*.

### PEACE OFFICER TRAINING AMENDMENTS HB 162

Rep. Angela Romero, Sen. Luz Escamilla

This bill requires a minimum number of hours for peace officer training related to appropriate responses to mental health and other crisis intervention responses, arrest control, and de-escalation training. Officers must be well trained in these areas to keep both our public safety officers and the public safe. *Signed by Governor.* 



### JAIL PHOTO DISTRIBUTION PROHIBITION HB 228

Rep. Keven Stratton, Sen. Michael Kennedy

This bill categorizes mugshots of individuals who have not been convicted as protected records. This would prevent the distribution of mugshots in the public domain or to publish-for-pay websites unless the person is convicted of the crime or another urgent public safety need, such as the individual being a fugitive. Passage of this bill strikes a good balance by preventing the government from releasing these photos in the first place with some limited and reasonable exceptions and ensuring that people are treated as innocent until proven guilty. Even after someone is found not guilty or charges have been dropped, a public mugshot lasts forever and has lasting consequences for these individuals.

Signed by Governor.

#### **ELECTRONIC LOCATION AMENDMENTS | HB 251**

Rep. Ryan Wilcox, Sen. John Johnson

This bill will stop some questionable surveillance practices ("reverse-location" data) by requiring a warrant before allowing officers to tap into this tracking data. It also will prevent law enforcement from over-collecting information through some methods about individuals who are not even suspected of a crime. *Signed by Governor*.

### PROFESSIONAL LICENSING AMENDMENTS SB 87

Sen. Curtis Bramble, Rep. Candice Pierucci

This bill removes heavy government mandates for those wishing to work in the cosmetology industry. This bill will remove the requirement to have a full cosmetology license for those wishing to work at blow-dry bar-type businesses, where they will only be washing, drying, or styling hair. Health and safety issues are addressed with a mandated course on proper public health and safety practices. This eliminates many barriers, including tens of thousands of dollars and nearly two years of school time, and allows those with the talent to enter the profession and provide their services to the public. *Signed by Governor*.

#### **LICENSING AMENDMENTS | HB 126**

Rep. Brady Brammer, Sen. Curtis Bramble

This bill amends the definition of hair braiding, which allows some practitioners to perform certain cosmetology techniques without needing a full cosmetology license. *Signed by Governor.* 



#### **GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEE AMENDMENTS | HB 139**

Rep. Norman Thurston, Sen. Daniel Thatcher

This bill moves Utah governmental hiring practices toward competency-based hiring and away from requiring a minimum education requirement. Instead, the state will take into consideration comparable experience or ability

Signed by Governor.

### MASSAGE THERAPY PRACTICE ACT AMENDMENTS | SB 149

Sen. Wayne Harper, Rep. Joel Ferry

This bill exempts certain professionals from also having to be licensed as a massage therapist and also exempts certain non-massage-related practices from requiring a massage therapy license. We support constant reviews of licensing requirements and exempting professionals and practices that don't fall under the scope of the license. *Signed by Governor*.

#### **UTILITY PERMITTING AMENDMENTS | HB 17**

Rep. Stephen Handy, Sen. David Hinkins

This bill prohibits municipalities from banning the use of certain types of energy utility services.

Signed by Governor.

#### **HIGHER EDUCATION SPEECH | HB 159**

Rep. Jordan Teuscher, Sen. Todd Weiler

This bill will protect the right of freedom of speech and expression on higher education campuses statewide and creates a cause of action for those discriminated against. It fosters an environment where differing opinions are not stifled simply because others don't want to hear them. *Signed by Governor*.

### PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT ACT AMENDMENTS SB 27

Sen. Curtis Bramble, Rep. James Dunnigan

This bill allows physician assistants to independently practice to the full extent of their training and expertise without supervision after completing 10,000 hours of supervised care. Passage of the bill also allows physician assistants who have completed 4,000 hours of physician-supervised care to complete their remaining 6,000 hours under the supervision of another physician assistant. *Signed by Governor.* 

# PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT MENTAL HEALTH PRACTICE AMENDMENTS | SB 28

Sen. Curtis Bramble, Rep. James Dunnigan

This bill would allow physician assistants to independently practice psychiatric mental health care without physician supervision after completing 10,000 hours of supervised care. *Signed by Governor.* 

#### **PHARMACY PRACTICE MODIFICATIONS | HB 178**

Rep. Norman Thurston, Sen. Curtis Bramble

This bill allows pharmacists (practicing within their education and experience) to prescribe certain non-controlled substance medications and devices under conditions, creating a more accessible and streamlined process for patients. *Signed by Governor.* 

#### **NURSE PRACTICE ACT AMENDMENTS | HB 128**

Rep. Douglas Welton, Sen. Curtis Bramble

This bill now authorizes nurse practitioners to prescribe schedule II controlled substances (oxycodone, hydromorphone, adderall, etc.) without physician supervision and gets rid of the "consultation and referral plan" or supervisory requirements for NP's and allows them to practice to the full extent of their training and education, removing barriers to Utah patients receiving care. *Signed by Governor.* 



#### TRUANCY ENFORCEMENT MORATORIUM | SB 219

Sen. Daniel McCay, Rep. Candice Pierucci

This bill suspends truancy laws for one school year while society emerges from the pandemic. Truancy laws would be unenforceable until after the 2021-2022 school year is completed. *Signed by Governor.* 

### SINGLE-FAMILY HOUSING MODIFICATIONS HB 82

Rep. Raymond Ward, Sen. Jacob Anderegg

Passage of this bill reduces local barriers for housing affordability by preventing local governments from restricting the use of accessory dwellings within a homeowner's property. Utah is facing a severe housing shortage, and the government shouldn't be creating new barriers that make it more difficult for people to find affordable places to live. *Signed by Governor*.

#### **EMERGENCY RESPONSE AMENDMENTS | SB 195**

Sen. Evan Vickers, Rep. Val Peterson

Passage of this bill puts much-needed limits on executive and health department powers while still allowing for flexibility and immediate response needed from the executive branch during a genuine emergency. *Signed by Governor*.

#### **PERMITTING AMENDMENTS | SB 204**

Sen. Kirk Cullimore, Rep. Robert Spendlove

This bill establishes consistent standards for the permit application process. Individuals, businesses, etc seeking a permit should have basic standards that can be relied on when applying for permits instead of arbitrary, often burdensome processes and timeframes that create confusion and barriers to economic production in our state. *Passed Senate*.

### REGULATORY SANDBOX PROGRAM AMENDMENTS | HB 217

Rep. A. Cory Maloy, Sen. Ann Millner

This first in the nation bill will allow for a regulatory sandbox or deregulation of any new business in any industry, working with the Governor's Office of Economic Development. Passage of this bill will further break down barriers to entrepreneurship, increase competition, and encourage innovation in Utah, a great model for economic development in our state. *Signed by Governor*.

#### **SALES TAX REVISIONS | HB 94**

Sen. Lincoln Fillmore, Rep. Jefferson Moss

This bill further exempts certain tangible personal property used during a service. *Passed Senate*.

### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AMENDMENTS SB 18

Sen. Wayne Harper, Rep. Karianne Lisonbee

This bill reforms Utah's tangible personal property laws, helping small businesses save time and money on reporting requirements by increasing the personal property exemption. *Signed by Governor*.

# MICROENTERPRISE HOME KITCHEN AMENDMENTS | HB 94

Rep. Christine Watkins, Sen. Evan Vickers

This bill will allow for more home-based food businesses in Utah, currently prevented from serving meat products. Health and safety standards are included in the requirements. *Signed by Governor*.

# ELECTRONIC FREE SPEECH AMENDMENTS SB 228

Sen. Michael McKell, Rep. Brady Brammer

While the bill's purpose was to promote free speech, if enacted and enforced, it would result in the opposite outcome—less speech for Utahns. When companies are exposed to liability, they will mitigate that risk by restricting the speech of their users. Far from "freeing" speech, this bill would have the effect of reducing it. Had this bill not been vetoed by the governor, it would have been challenged and struck down in court, costing Utah taxpayers millions. *Vetoed by Governor*.

#### PRIVACY PROTECTION AMENDMENTS | HB 243


Rep. Francis Gibson, Sen. Kirk Cullimore

This bill will protect the privacy rights of all Utahns. The bill creates a personal privacy oversight committee within the Office of the State Auditor, reviewing how law enforcement and other state agencies use emerging technology and their privacy standards for the data they receive. The Committee will be composed of a diverse team of privacy and civil liberties experts. The creation of the Oversight Committee will increase public trust and compliance with state and federal law. *Signed by Governor.* 

### DIGITAL OPPORTUNITY ACCESS AMENDMENTS HB 304

Rep. Jennifer Dailey-Provost, Sen Scott Sandall


This bill Creates a Digital Equity Program within Utah's library division. This is very similar to the broadband councils we see in other states, and this program would have similar objectives. We support states having centralized offices to help coordinate state broadband policy with the many different stakeholders in this space. *Passed House*.
